### Section - A

- 1. How does Coleridge incorporate super-natural elements in the poem, "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner"? What is the function of these elements? How do the supernatural elements relate to the natural elements?
- 2. Attempt a critical appreciation of Keats' "Ode on a Grecian Urn."

- 3. Give an estimate of Browning as a poet with special reference to the poems that you have read.
- 4. How does the poem, "The Wasteland" describe the reality of the contemporary wasteland? Evaluate it critically.

- 6. What is the central theme of the poem "Church Going"?

- 8. Discuss briefly how Auden's "In Praise of Limestone" is "a wistful reminder of how the limestone landscape, especially

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during the war-torn totalitarian days of the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century, can offer an alternative of peace and beauty."
